




Q2 Do you have minor children regularly residing at your home?



















1	Any consideration of a third crosswalk is premature and should only be considered after the already planned crosswalks at Pondfield and Tanglewylde are completed. There are numerous other locations where a crosswalk or sidewalk would be better located than a third crosswalk across Rt. 22 between Pondfield and Tanglewylde. Any crosswalk across Rt. 22 without a full traffic light is unsafe. This survey was not sent to all village residents, or even to residents who will be directly negatively affected by new sidewalk and crosswalk construction. This survey – and in particular question 11 – contains no indication of the costs being imposed on homeowners adjacent to the to-be-constructed sidewalks required by the third crosswalk, despite the recommendation from a group of affected residents that those costs be disclosed to survey recipients. Specifically, question 4 asks simply whether a third crosswalk would be "desirable," not whether it is worth imposing costs on neighboring homeowners to install further sidewalks. The questions that ask about the frequency of crossing Rt. 22 do not offer the option of answering move than never (zero) but less than once per week (despite the recommendations of those of us who commented on the draft survey). Other questions – e.g., 6 and 10 – do not allow a resppnse indicating objection to any crosswalk and merge the reasons for currently crossing Rt. 22 with the potential reasons why someone might cross Rt. 22 between Pondfield and Tanglewylde if a new crosswalk is installed there.	4/21/2023 5:01 PM
2	1) Our view is that having a crosswalk at an uncontrolled intersection (no traffic light) on a state road where the speed limit is 30 mph will create a false sense of security for those crossing there. It would be better to be on guard and cross when there is a break in the traffic as children have safely done for decades. Even at the crosswalks in town on Midland by the school and on Kraft Ave, by St Joes School, where the speed limit is a 20 mph school zone, we regularly see cars ignore pedestrians trying to cross, and often cars even speed up to get through the crosswalks before the crossing guards can control traffic. Imagining this scenario on White Plains Rd, without a traffic light, and without a crossing guard, seems dangerous. Cars respond to traffic signals. In fact, many pedestrian incidents in town have actually happened specifically IN crosswalks (Pondfield and Midland, by Taco Project, by St Joe's, etc). 2) We object to installing sidewalks on the east side of Route 22 because this would require the removal of many old growth trees and beautiful landscaping and saddle our fellow neighbors with the legal and financial liability that comes with sidewalk ownership. This does not seem like a fair burden in exchange for the benefit of the very few residents who cross route 22 on a regular basis there (outside of days where they know DOT is counting). If you do go ahead with a crosswalk, could you minimize sidewalk to a landing pad small area as a compromise to residents impacted? 3) There are many more productive uses of our limited taxpayer dollars within the Village, focused on higher pedestrian traffic areas and on improving and repairing some of the existing infrastructure on Route 22, especially the dilapidated sidewalks on west side of Route 22. It seems like an expensive project for the benefit of a few vocal residents. neighborhood directly adjacent to the proposed crosswalk area. Bronxville does not need more pavement, flashing lights and signage in a residential area that is almost a mile from the town center. There are already stoplights at Pondfield and Tanglewylde, and (much safer) crosswalks can easily be added to those controlled intersections, without burdening adjacent homeowners. I'm not sure that a flashing beacon will safely stop traffic that includes tractor trailers and double length buses routinely traveling at 35mph on Rte. 22. In summary, this project is likely a waste of taxpayer money, and is not a safer alternative to crossing Route 22 at a controlled intersection with adult supervision.

6	The notion of safe passage across Rt. 22 is not objectionable. What is objectionable is the staunch focus on the construction of a crosswalk between Pondfield and Tanglewylde. The points are summarized below: 1. Safety: We firmly believe that a crosswalk between Pondfield and Tanglewylde across Rt. 22 will provide pedestrians with a false sense of security. Unlike the future crosswalks at both Pondfield and Tanglewylde, which each have a four-way stop light and bus stops, a crossing point between the two aforementioned roads would be unnatural and obscure. These factors create a dangerous crossing point for pedestrians, even if marked, particularly on a road which routinely experiences vehicle speeds of more than 35mph. In fact, it has been revealed that this was this position of the Bronxville Police Chief in 2021. 2. Allocation and appropriation of funds: The construction of a crosswalk and associated sidewalks between Pondfield and Tanglewylde will require the commitment of significant funding. However, the infrastructure around the future crosswalks at Pondfield and Tanglewylde is in need of significant repair and improvements.
