We are thinking the anticipated budget surplus could translate into more road and streetscape improvements including our needed municipal tree replenishment!

February is synonymous with all things budget: State obligation, County of Westchester, Town of Eastchester and Fire District as well as the Village's annual budget which is on the June 1st to May 31st cycle.

Though only 15% of your total property tax obligation, we are actively aware that every dollar saved by steadfast oversight is critical, and we spend months honing our budget.

February also kicked off a new season for our energetic and reinvigorated Chamber of Commerce which could not hold group events for almost three years. Co-chaired by Leah Caro of Sterling Park Realty and Yiota Koriniotu of Bronxville Diner the team is back and needs our support. Shopping at our local merchants last year garnered \$1,604,144 tax dollars to the Village budget. Without this line item, taxes would have to be raised 14.0% or services severely curtailed.

Shopping local remains the best financial bargain in the Village.

We are looking forward to March being the 80th anniversary of our Adult School. Similar to our venerable movie theatre, its importance to the fabric of the Village cannot be overestimated. Please support it as you so generously did for the theatre to keep it going for another 80 vears.

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### **NEWS FROM THE TRUSTEES**

The Village Board meeting on January 9th included a presentation of the 2021-22 Financial Statements to the Village Board of Trustees. Alan Kassay, Partner of PKF O'Connor Davies, the Village's Financial Auditors, presented the statements to the Board and summarized the findings. The Village increased its unassigned fund balance to \$8,724,568 (an increase of \$493,257) due in large part to an increase in sales tax revenue which continued to remain strong. Building permits and court fines also came in above budgeted and reflect continued improvement following Covid. Expenses came in below budgeted in large part due to a lower than projected increase in health insurance premiums.

The Board of Trustees closed the public hearing on Local Law 5 amending our Speed Limits on Village streets and roadways and unanimously agreed to a reduced maximum speed limit of 25 m.p.h. Village-wide. The Village Board relied in part on the findings and determination by the consulting engineer charged with completing an engineering review in compliance with the adopted state legislation. The Board agreed to make the legislation effective September 1st to allow for an effective implementation which would include an extensive educational and outreach campaign. Additionally, on January 11th the Village Board agreed to petition New York State to reduce the speed limit on State Route 22 to 25 m.p.h.

The Village Board appointed the Village Administrator, James Palmer, to serve as the Budget Officer once again for the 2023-24 budget. A timeline for key dates for the 2023-24 budget is as follows:

- Feb. 01, 2023: Assessor files tentative Assessment Roll
- Mar. 20, 2023: Administrator files tentative budget and circulates to the Village Board
- Apr. 01, 2023: Assessor files final Assessment Roll
- Apr. 10, 2023: Public Hearing is held on the budget
- May 01, 2023: Last date by which budget must be adopted
- June 1, 2023: Taxes levied on the 2023-24 tax roll

The Village Board will also hold at least one work session on the budget during this period.

The County of Westchester, Town of Eastchester and the Eastchester Fire Department all have fiscal years that commence January 1. Their respective budgets for the 2023 fiscal/calendar year can be accessed here:

- Town of Eastchester
- County of Westchester
- Eastchester Fire Department

The NYS executive budget was filed on February 1st and is currently being reviewed by the State Legislature. The State's fiscal year commences April 1st.

The Village Board authorized the Police Department's participation in the County's Stop DWI High Visibility Engagement Campaign and to seek reimbursement through this grant program. The Village Board also authorized the transfer of \$52,876 to the Library Fund reflecting the balance of what was approved for the Library for the 21-22 fiscal year but had remained unspent at the end of the fiscal year.

On January 11th, the Village Board held a work session to discuss a variety of subjects including next steps on the Route 22 crosswalk. The Village Board updates on this issue can be found here.

The Village Board discussed the timetable for the review of the Village's outdoor dining programs and authorized the Village Administrator to execute the scope of work with our consultant, Street Plans. Initial meetings with restaurant owners are now scheduled for Tuesday, February 14th at 8:30am to 10:30am and 1:00pm to 3:00pm. An opportunity for public comment will be held at 3pm on Tuesday, February 14th. The Board requested that the Administrator also share the recent actions by the Town of Greenwich, CT concerning their outdoor dining program with our Consultant.

The upcoming February 13th Village Board Meeting will include a resolution to fund the purchase of additional LED streetlights to replace the remaining 60 incandescent bulbs. The Village Board will also authorize the sale of surplus equipment including replaced police cars using the Village's vendor Auction International.

The Board will also consider resolutions on the following items at their February 13th meeting:

- The scheduling of a public hearing for a local law to increase the membership of the Design Review Committee (DRC) to five (5) members from three (3) and to simplify the approval process for sign applications.
- A resolution to authorize participation in a DEC grant program for the creation of a Climate Action Plan
- A resolution to authorize the solicitation of pledges for improvements to Maltby Park by the Friends of Maltby Park
- A resolution to authorize additional funding to replace playground equipment at Sagamore Park
- A resolution to authorize a tax lien sale for unpaid taxes for 2021-22 fiscal year
- A resolution to schedule a public hearing for tax cap override legislation

#### PUBLIC WORKS NEWS

Over the past several weeks, DPW staff has been taking advantage of the lack of snow to complete various projects including the continued replacement of incandescent lighting fixtures with new LED bulbs. Not only will this brighten our streets and sidewalks, but it will also help to reduce the Village's carbon footprint. The work is ongoing and anyone who observes a light fixture that may be out or not working properly should contact DPW to request a repair or by visiting the website.

Also, a friendly reminder to please keep your sidewalks clear of snow and ice. Your cooperation is essential to ensuring our sidewalks are safe and accessible.

Finally, on January 31st, DPW staff received CPR training led by the Police Department's certified instructors. The in-person training combined informational lectures with hands-on skills.

# Dedication of the Kelly Center for Health Sciences NewYork-Presbyterian Iona School of Health Sciences

The Mayor and members of the Board of Trustees were honored to be present for the dedication which took place on January 12th. The new 32,000 s.f. state of the art facility spans three floors consisting of classroom seminar rooms, simulation rooms and laboratory rooms which allow for hands on training for students and their teachers. Located on Iona's new campus (formerly Concordia College), the Kelly Center for Health Sciences will serve as the flagship building of the NewYork-Presbyterian Iona School of Health Sciences. The facility was made possible in large part by a \$5 million dollar gift by the Kelly family. The dedication included several presentations including remarks by Iona University President Seamus Carey, Ph.D, Alfred F. Kelly, Jr, as well as a pre-recorded presentation by the Archbishop of New York, Cardinal Timothy M. Dolan.
